Barbara Gittings

Barbara was a leader of the Daughters of Bilitus, USA's first lesbian civil rights organization. She was a prominent activist in the fight to remove homosexuality from the list of psychiatric disorders.

Billy Porter

Billy is an actor, singer, writer, director, and advocate for Black, gender nonconforming, and trans people.

"As Black people, we risk our lives every time we leave our homes. As queer people of color that risk is doubled."



Angelica Ross

Angelica is an actress and founder of TransTech Social Enterprises, an organization empowering trans and gender nonconforming people through on-the-job training in leadership and workplace skills.

"My mission is to prove that everyone has the right to pursue their dreams."



Jose Sarria

Jose was a WW II veteran, drag performer, and activist who became the first openly gay candidate for public office in the United States in 1961. He also helped found several organizations, such as the League for Civil Education that became the Society for Individual Rights.

"You don't have to conform, you are what you are and that's it. I am what I am, and that's it."



Kim Coco Iwamoto

Kim Coco is an activist and advocate who became the highest-ranking openly transgender elected official in the United States when she was elected to the Hawaii Board of Education in 2006. She also served as commissioner on the Hawaii Civil Rights Commission.

"I recognize the inequities and inequalities of our daily lives, and this awareness drives my commitment to social justice."

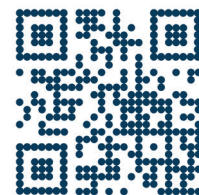

Equality Illinois builds a better Illinois by advancing equal treatment and full acceptance of the LGBTQ community.



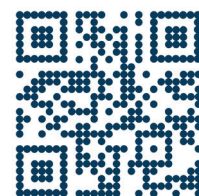
